Dear student, labour and community activists,

The Canadian Federation of Students is Canada's largest student organisation, representing over 500,000 college and university students who are members of more than 85 campus students' unions. The Federation's Manitoba component, the Canadian Federation of Students–Manitoba, is hosting a unique assembly of student and campus activists from across Manitoba to build a fighting student movement.

The first-ever Manitoba Campus Activist Assembly will take place on October 17 and 18, 2008 at the downtown campus of the University of Winnipeg, in the Bulman Students' Centre. The intention is to bring together rank-and-file student and youth activists, campus labour activists and community activists. This assembly will feature a variety of issuesbased sessions and skills training workshops aimed at providing an interactive opportunity to develop strong local and intercampus organising capacities.

In order to promote broad-based and inclusive participation at this Assembly, there will be **no registration fees!** Food will be provided, financial and fundraising support is available for transportation and childcare, and Assembly organisers are committed to helping coordinate billeting, French language interpretation, and other accommodations for all participants.

This historic gathering of students' union volunteers, campus activists, club and department representatives, and community allies is happening in a critical year. This is the final year of the Manitoba government's commitment to the tuition fee freeze, with full deregulation planned for fall 2009. Backwardly, the Doer government has created the Levin Commission on Tuition and Accessibility of Post-Secondary Education, part of a bid to justify its unpopular decision. In Ontario, lifting the freeze has meant plans for fee hikes of 20 to 36 percent by the McGuinty government. In Saskatchewan, the Saskatchewan Party government has announced plans to end the tuition fee freeze and allow "incremental" fee hikes. In Manitoba, Ontario and Saskatchewan, students are organising to fight the regressive schemes forwarded by governments of all political stripes. In order to ramp up public pressure on the Doer government, CFS-Manitoba is launching a province-wide campaign to Drop Fees as part of a comprehensive strategy to promote universal access to higher education. It is hoped that the Assembly will help activists develop the skills necessary to mobilise effectively for the campaign to Drop Fees, including the November 5 Student Day of Action and escalating actions throughout the year.

Building for change requires collaboration, commitment and creativity. This assembly will be an avenue for activists to share perspectives and experiences, gain confidence, learn new skills, and discuss different strategies and tactics. There will be exciting speakers, interactive discussions and hands-on training.

We are striving to bring together students and other campus activists who are working for a better world by challenging poverty, student debt, privatisation, sweatshop labour, military recruitment, environmental degradation, discrimination, harassment, and all forms of social and economic oppression on campuses. The Assembly will also be a chance to broaden and deepen our collective understanding of the privatisation of education by looking at larger social issues in our lives.

We hope that you will participate in the Assembly and help to build a united student movement. If you require a place to sleep or shared transportation, please ensure that you register no later than Wednesday, October 8, 2008.

Assembly Objectives & Anti-Oppression Principles

The Manitoba Campus Activist Assembly will bring together student, labour and community activists to build unity and develop strategies that use public college and university campuses as venues to work for progressive social change. In particular, we are seeking to:

- Build a strong and united student movement and work in solidarity with other social movements;
- Oppose financial barriers to post-secondary education and other social programmes;
- Oppose the privatisation and corporatisation of campuses and public services; and
- Challenge racism, sexism, homophobia, transphobia, ableism, colonialism and all other forms of prejudice and discrimination on campus and in society.

Fulfilling these objectives requires open discussion but cannot be accomplished in an environment that is poisonous or unsafe. Discrimination or harassment occurs when a comment or action is made that is known or ought to be known to be unwelcome or offensive.

Discriminatory speech or conduct is any behaviour that demeans, marginalises, rejects, threatens or harms others. It can be based on ability, experience, age, class, education, sex or sexual identity, gender identity or expression, race, ethnicity, colour, immigration status, indigenous heritage, language, nationality, religion, physical appearance or place of origin.

Sometimes, discrimination takes the form of harassment. Harassment is the expression of real or perceived power over another person to abuse, devalue or humiliate. Sexual harassment is any unwelcome sexual advance, statement or request for sexual contact, and other unwelcome verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature.

Harassment is not a joke. It is cruel and destructive behaviour that can have devastating effects. It creates feelings of unease, humiliation and discomfort. Solidarity is based on the principle that all people are equal and deserve mutual respect. Harassment, by fellow activists in particular, is contrary to our basic principles of solidarity and equality.

Commitment to equity

As organisers and participants of the Manitoba Campus Activist Assembly, we are committed to working towards social justice and equity within an anti-oppression framework. Discrimination and harassment divide us. They reduce our capacity to work together on shared concerns such as accessible post-secondary education and justice on campus and in our social movements.

As a condition of participation in this Assembly, we expect that all attendees commit to these objectives and work to uphold these anti-oppression principles.
