COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

ORAL ENGLISH FOR ACADEMIC PURPOSES

Conversation and Discussion [ESLC 0260]

In this course, students will practise speaking skills necessary for maintaining conversations and participating in discussions. Practice will include effective questioning and requesting, giving opinions, asking for clarification, and offering suggestions. Common Canadian idioms will also be studied. **Fee: \$30**^

Oral Presentations ● [ESLC 0250]

This course is designed to give students practice in speaking skills required for full participation in academic presentations. Students will learn strategies that native speakers use in presenting information, in expressing opinions and in questioning others. They will practise these skills in discussions and short speeches. Videotapes may be used to provide speech models and to monitor student performance. Fee: \$30^

Pronunciation ● [ESLC 0270]

The purpose of this course is to provide students with initial insight into their strengths and weaknesses in pronunciation and to assist students in improving their comprehensibility. Focused practise on specific problem areas will be provided in class. The instructor will also suggest techniques for continued polishing after the course. Fee: \$30^

ACADEMIC WRITING

Academic Essays [ESLC 0230]

In this course students will focus on the writing process and develop skills needed to write an organized and coherent essay for university. Pre-writing, drafting, editing and revision, paragraph and essay organization, and integration of quotations will be discussed and practiced. Sentence level grammar, based on student needs, will be an ongoing area of instruction throughout the course, along with some exposure to useful academic vocabulary and phrases. Regular written and oral feedback will be provided with attention given to individual needs. Fee: \$30^

 Required Text: Oshima, A. & Hogue, A. (2014). Longman Academic Writing Series, Level 4 Essays (5th ed.). Pearson.

Critical Reading & Summary Writing [ESLC 0240]

Research shows that good reading skills can lead to well written assignments. In this course, students will learn reading strategies to understand and retain information, understand the organization of reading passages, and acquire new vocabulary. In addition, students will practise writing summaries and critiques, tasks that are essential in university courses. Assignments will relate to the specific academic tasks required of students. Fee: \$30^

Grammar Review [ESLC 0220]

The focus in this course will be on increasing proficiency in grammatical conventions, practising a variety of sentence structures and developing paragraphs. Students will practise the functions of description, comparison, exemplification and argumentation in short pieces of writing. Editing skills will be a regular feature of the class. Individuals are encouraged to bring specific concerns to the instructor's attention. Fee: \$30^

Students will practise writing rhetorical patterns common in scientific writing. Students will select articles from a journal common to their present area of research. They will then study the form of these articles in order to better appreciate the nature of research writing. Students will complete a variety of grammar exercises according to their individual needs and practise editing skills. **Fee: \$30**^

BANNATYNE CAMPUS (not offered Spring or Summer)

Oral English for Graduate Students (Medicine) • [ESLC 0292] - Fall

The purpose of this course is to provide students with initial insight into their strengths and weaknesses in pronunciation and to assist students in improving their comprehensibility. Focused practice on specific problem areas will be provided in class. Using an action-learning approach, students will learn and practice strategies such as intonation, stress, rhythm, pacing, and non-verbal communication for the effective delivery of oral presentations, for leading seminars, and also for interacting with colleagues and with patients. **Fee: \$30**^

Research Writing for Graduate Students (Medicine)

• [ESLC 0112] - Winter

Students will practise writing rhetorical patterns common in scientific writing. Students will select articles from a journal common to their present area of research. They will then study the form of these articles in order to better appreciate the nature of research writing. Students will complete a variety of grammar exercises according to their individual needs and practise editing skills. **Fee: \$30**^
