

Brazilian artist Roosivelt Pinhiero's printed textiles, politically charged and sold for only \$3.30 each, arrive in the Pool Room directly from the artist's studio in Rio De Janeiro, 9674 km away. They are made for Brazilian activists and protesters and reflect the frustration of a nation exhausted by ongoing corruption and scandal. Pinheiro's prints present a who's-who of infamously crooked Brazilian politicians as well as his heroes alongside one another. Using symbolic, emotionally charged materials – tote bags and foot rags – Pinheiro amplifies the voices of the protesters in his neighborhood. As his work travels far from its home, it brings greater international awareness to the still-unfolding, tumultuous situation in Brazil that inspires the work.

This exhibition was conceived and prepared by Prof. Oliver Botar and the students of FAAH 3930: Introduction to Curatorial Studies (School of Art), 2019 and is open 29 November to 6 December 2019. There will be a closing panel discussion and reception at the Gallery on 6 December, 11:30-14:00. All are welcome. Pool Room is located in the foyer of the Architecture II building on the University of Manitoba's Fort Garry Campus and is fully accessible.
