

Tiny Engines of Abundance

A History of Peasant Productivity and Repression

JIM HANDY



Dr. Jim Handy is a Professor and Chair of the History Department at the University of Saskatchewan, where he has taught since 1986. He has won numerous teaching awards, including the College of Arts and Science Teaching Excellence Award and Best Instructor in Saskatoon in the Planet S Magazine Annual Best awards. He also received the J. W.George Ivany Internationalization Award from the University of Saskatchewan and the Distinguished Fellow award from the Canadian Association for Latin American and Caribbean Studies.

He is the author of Apostles of Inequality: Rural Poverty, Political Economy, and the Economist, 1760–1860 (Toronto: University of Toronto Press, forthcoming spring 2022); Revolution in the Countryside: Rural Conflict and Agrarian Reform in Guatemala, 1944–1954 (Chapel Hill: University of North Carolina Press, 1994) [Spanish translation: Revolución en el Area Rural: Conflicto rural y reforma agraria en Guatemala (Guatemala City: Universidad de San Carlos, 2013); and Gift of the Devil: A History of Guatemala (Toronto/Boston: Between the Lines/Southend, 1984), as well as numerous articles and chapters.
