The early 1900s hydroelectric boom near Lake of the Woods that powered settler communities also flooded manomin (wild rice) fields, washed away roads and compromised fish populations, undermining a treaty with Dr. Luby's ancestors. She and Chief Cobiness are among the women committed to revitalizing manomin crops in the region. Luby's new book [Dammed](#) is available from the University of Manitoba Press.
